Dispur: Chief Minister Dr. Himanta Biswa Sarma inaugurated the permanent site of the Assam Cricket Association's Cricket Academy and the Guwahati Town Club's Football Academy at Fulung in North Guwahati. Notably, the campus of the Assam Cricket Association's Cricket Academy has been equipped with 10 practice wickets, a cricket ground with five centre wickets, one of the largest indoor cricket halls in the country with 10 wickets, residential facilities for players, and provisions for technical directors, coaches, and other staff. Similarly, the Guwahati Town Club's Football Academy has been provided with two football grounds, a 60-bed hostel, and a football pavilion, with future plans to make arrangements for indoor games. Both academies have provisions to impart training under the guidance of coaches of international standards. Speaking on the occasion, Dr. Sarma said that through these two academies, a major sporting infrastructure for both football and cricket has been created to support and encourage budding sportspersons. He added that with systematic training, guidance from national and international standard coaches, and regular monitoring, positive outcomes could be expected, thereby fulfilling the purpose of establishing the academies. The Chief Minister noted that until 2003-04, Assam had no advanced sports infrastructure other than the Nehru Stadium in Guwahati and another stadium in Jorhat. At present, however, the state



Bokakhat: A road accident occurred on Tuesday on National Highway 37 at Rajabari under Bokakhat police station, in which one person died on the spot. The rider, who was employed at Numaligarh Refinery, died instantly after the bike collided head-on with the container. The deceased has been identified as Kumud Doley of Rajabari. Police have recovered the body.

Dikhow river erosion threatens Nazira

locals blame government negligence

NAZIRA: The Dikhow river has been causing massive erosion in Nazira's Bihubar and Simaluguri areas, with the erosion continuing unabated in the Bihubar Garumur Pujabasti area. Despite repeated complaints, the state government's water resources department seems to be unaware of the situation. The local residents have accused the department of negligence and expressed concerns about the impact of the erosion on their lives and livelihoods. The erosion has been causing widespread damage to the land and property of the local residents, with many families facing the threat of displacement. The residents have been demanding immediate action from the authorities to mitigate the situation, but so far, no concrete steps have been taken. The local residents of Bihubor have also accused the authorities of allowing illegal mining of stones and boulders in the Dikhow river, which has exacerbated the erosion problem.

Nagaon Cauple Makes Noble Pledge for Organ Donation, MLA Falicitates

Nagaon, Aug 18: In a profound act selflessness, Nagaon Gautam residents Chandra Saha (64) and his wife, Soma Saha (56), have pledged to donate their organs and tissues after death through the National Organ and Tissue **Transplant Organization**



(NOTTO). Their commitment is in line with the "Angdaan - Jeevan Sanjeevani Abhiyaan," the Government of India's nationwide

campaign to promote organ donation.

The couple was recently felicitated for their noble decision by MLA Rupak Sarmah during an event organized by the NGO, Touch of Humanity, at the District Library Auditorium. This social recognition highlights the growing importance of community-led initiatives in the national health movement, inspired by a strong scientific temperament.

Gautam Chandra Saha, proprietor of a wholesale medicine dealership, and his wife Soma Saha, a dedicated homemaker and family matriarch, have committed to donating all their viable organs and tissues, including the liver, kidneys, heart, lungs, skin, bone, and corneas. Their pledge has been officially registered with NOTTO, the apex body under the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MoHFW), which oversees the national network for organ and tissue donation.

This compassionate act by the Saha family underscores the critical need for organ donors in India. According to reports, the country's organ donation rate is approximately 0.5 donors per million population, a stark contrast to more than 30 donors per million in some Western nations. The potential to save lives is immense, as one deceased donor can provide a new lease on life for up to eight individuals through organ donation alone, in addition to improving the quality of life for many others through tissue donation.

Meanwhile, the "Angdaan - Jeevan Sanjeevani Abhiyaan" (2025-26) is designed to bridge this gap by raising public awareness and dispelling myths surrounding organ donation. The exemplary pledge by Gautam and Soma Saha serves as a powerful call to action, reinforcing the campaign's message that organ donation offers an opportunity to give the gift of life. Their decision reflects a deep commitment to society and a lasting legacy of hope. Their act also serves as a humble appeal for others to voluntarily come forward and contribute to this vital movement for the greater interest of humanity.

Appointed as Vice Chancellor of Nagaon University

A Visionary Step for Assam's Higher Education

The appointment of Dr. Hitesh Deka as the Vice Chancellor of Nagaon University by the Government of Assam is far more than a routine administrative development; it is an affirmation of wisdom, intellect, and experience in guiding a newly established institution towards the promise of excellence. At a time when higher education in Assam is undergoing both transformation and turmoil, with newer universities emerging while older ones struggle under the weight of expectations and challenges, this appointment symbolises a conscious choice to blend vision with pragmatism, leadership with humility, and scholarship with administrative acumen.

The story of Nagaon University is still in its infancy. Born from the aspirations of a district with rich historical, cultural, and intellectual traditions, the institution stands as a beacon of hope for thousands of young students in middle Assam who seek quality education without having to migrate to distant centres. In such a critical phase, when identity, structure, and academic direction are still in the making, the choice of Vice Chancellor becomes decisive. It is not merely about filling a post but about laying the foundation of a legacy. That is where the appointment of Dr Hitesh Deka assumes special significance. He comes not just as an administrator but as a teacher, an intellectual, and a cultural personality who has lived through the many currents of Assam's academic and literary life.

To appreciate the full measure of this development, one must reflect upon Dr. Deka's journey. He is not a stranger to the academic corridors of Assam; rather, he is one of its familiar voices and guiding lights. Having spent decades in the world of literature, philosophy, media, and education, he carries with him a rare synthesis of multiple disciplines. His intellectual universe stretches from the world of Assamese literature to the domains of communication and cultural studies. This synthesis is particularly important for a university in a place like Nagaon, which itself has historically been a meeting point of cultures, languages, and traditions. To appoint a Vice Chancellor who embodies this plurality is to recognise the soul of the region itself.

Dr. Hitesh Deka is known not just for his academic contributions but for his art of speaking, which is often described as artistic in itself. His ability to communicate complex ideas with clarity and elegance has endeared him to students, colleagues, and audiences across Assam. In the world of academia, where the spoken word often bridges the gap between abstract thought and young minds, this quality is invaluable. The art of speaking, when nurtured by knowledge and humility, becomes a tool of inspiration. Dr Deka has mastered this art, and his lectures and public addresses have often been remembered as much for their content as for their delivery. For a new university, where the first task of a leader is to inspire confidence and kindle curiosity, such qualities will undoubtedly leave a lasting impact.

Nagaon itself occupies a unique place in Assam's intellectual geography. Known as the birthplace of the saint-scholar Sankardev, it has historically been associated with knowledge, reform, and culture. The district has produced writers, reformers, politicians, and artists who have shaped the contours of Assamese identity. In many ways, the establishment of a university here is a natural continuation of this heritage. But to carry forward such a legacy requires leadership that can see beyond bureaucratic routines and administrative files. It requires someone who can interpret the past while envisioning the future. In Dr. Hitesh Deka, the state seems to have found precisely such a figure.


Higher education in Assam today faces multiple crises. While the number of institutions has increased, the quality of education, research culture, and infrastructure often lag behind. Many universities function with acute faculty shortages, inadequate laboratories, and insufficient exposure to global academic trends. Moreover, a deep disconnect often exists between the curriculum and the aspirations of students. Amidst these realities, the task before the Vice Chancellor of any new university

is daunting. For Nagaon University, the challenge is doubled, for it must not only establish its own credibility but also resist the mediocrity that often engulfs new institutions. The appointment of Dr. Hitesh Deka suggests that the Government of Assam is serious about addressing these concerns by choosing someone who understands both the challenges and the possibilities.

Dr. Deka's academic and administrative credentials already testify to his capability. Having been closely associated with Gauhati University and various academic bodies, he is well aware of the structural and cultural problems of higher education in the state. His earlier works, both in the literary and academic domains, reveal a thinker who is not afraid to ask difficult questions. He has also played roles that connect him to larger networks of college education, having once been associated as a leader with the All Assam College Principal Association, where he contributed to shaping the discourse on the autonomy and responsibility of colleges. Such experiences are crucial in steering Nagaon University, for the success of a university depends not just on vision but also on negotiation—with government, with faculty, and with society at large.

The art of negotiation, however, must not be confused with compromise. A true leader knows where to yield and where to stand firm. By all accounts, Dr. Hitesh Deka has the reputation of being firm when it comes to matters of principle, while also being flexible when dialogue and accommodation are required. This balance will be particularly important for Nagaon University, which will soon have to carve out its identity among older universities Gauhati University, Dibrugarh University, and Tezpur University. To survive and flourish, it will have to develop its own academic niches, attract quality faculty, and earn the trust of students and guardians. These are not tasks that can be achieved by administrative orders alone; they require vision, patience, and persuasive leadership.

One of the remarkable aspects of Dr. Deka's persona is his engagement with literature and culture. He is not an academic who



confines himself within the walls of classrooms and offices; rather, he is a public intellectual who participates in the cultural conversations of Assam. His writings reflect sensitivity to human conditions, social questions, and philosophical dilemmas. Literature often provides the moral compass that pure administration lacks. In choosing such a personality as Vice Chancellor, the government seems to have recognised that universities are not factories of degrees but spaces of cultural and intellectual ferment. If nurtured well, Nagaon University under his leadership has the potential to become a centre that not only imparts knowledge but also shapes values, ethics, and creativity.

Universities are judged not just by their academic programmes but also by the culture they cultivate. Do they produce inquisitive, critical, and ethical citizens, or do they merely produce degree-holders? Do they encourage research that addresses local problems, or do they merely imitate global trends without context? These questions will soon confront Nagaon University, and the responsibility of answering them will rest with the Vice Chancellor. With his experience and sensitivity, Dr. Hitesh Deka is likely to emphasise contextual relevance without losing sight of global standards. Assam's universities often face the dilemma of either being too provincial or becoming pretentiously global. Striking the right balance between rootedness and openness is the true challenge, and it is here that Dr. Deka's vision may make a significant difference. Another vital dimension is student politics. Assam's campuses have historically been vibrant with political debates and student movements. While such activism has at times enriched democracy, it has also occasionally disrupted academic life. As a leader, the Vice Chancellor must navigate this terrain carefully, allowing space for see page 4

BTC Speaker Katiram Boro releases BTC's rule of procedure books

He further said that this rule book would help the students and researchers to follow the council's procedure besides preserving all records of business of the BTC Legislative Assembly.

Golaghat Nagarik Mancha demands action to control essential commodity prices

Golaghat: The Golaghat Nagarik Mancha urged the District Commissioner of Golaghat district to ensure that the prices of essential commodities like gram pea, moong, and edible oil are not increased during the Assamese month of 'Bhadoh'. A memorandum was submitted to the Deputy Commissioner on Tuesday, signed by the president, working president, and general secretary of the mancha. The memorandum highlighted that the recent price hike of essential commodities had caused hardship to the common people. During the Bhadoh month, devotees offer prayers and perform rituals at namphars, mandirs, and temples, and the price increase would add to their burden. The mancha also supported the ongoing eviction drive and urged the authorities to take administrative measures to prevent any law and order situation arising from social unrest. Additionally, the mancha requested the authorities to install permanent railings on the footpaths from Thana Chariali to Tokani Chariali and to ensure parking facilities for shoppers in front of V-Mart and Style Bazar. They have also urged the authorities to take action against street food vendors who are causing traffic congestion in front of Vishal Mega Mart. The Deputy Commissioner assured the mancha that he would look into the matter and take necessary action.

expression while ensuring that academics remain the central focus. Dr Deka's reputation as a communicator and as someone who commands respect among youth may prove vital here. His artistic approach to communication often defuses tension and turns conflicts into conversations. If he can extend this quality into the domain of student politics, Nagaon University may emerge as a model campus where democratic engagement coexists with academic seriousness.

The local community, too, will closely watch the progress of Nagaon University. For a district that has long cherished its heritage of Sankardev, Madhavdev, and other cultural icons, the university is not just an educational institution but a matter of identity and pride. Its success will depend on how well it engages with local society—by organising outreach programmes, cultural festivals, and community-oriented research. Universities that remain isolated often fail to garner local support, but those that integrate themselves into the lives of their regions thrive in the long run. Given Dr Hitesh Deka's cultural orientation, one can reasonably expect Nagaon University to develop strong bonds with its immediate environment.

The broader implications of this appointment extend beyond Nagaon. Assam is at a turning point in higher education, with multiple new universities being set up in recent years. Unless these institutions are guided with vision, they risk becoming degree-distributing centres with little intellectual or cultural contribution. The appointment of strong, visionary leaders like Dr Hitesh Deka is therefore not merely a local decision but a template for the state's higher education policy. It signals that experience, cultural sensitivity, and intellectual depth are valued in leadership roles. If this becomes the norm, Assam's universities may well rise from mediocrity and claim their rightful place in the academic map of India.

The government's decision to appoint Dr Hitesh Deka shows an awareness of this truth.

Expectations will run high, and criticism will not be absent. But the measure of leadership lies precisely in how one responds to these pressures. If the past is any indication, Dr Hitesh Deka is likely to respond not with despair but with creativity, not with defensiveness but with openness. His ability to draw upon both administrative experience and cultural wisdom will serve him well.

In this moment of promise, we extend our heartfelt prayers for Dr Hitesh Deka. May he be blessed with enduring good health, unyielding energy, and clarity of thought as he embarks upon this monumental responsibility. May every challenge before him be met with courage, every decision guided by deep insight, and every initiative imbued with purpose and vision. May wisdom accompany him in times of complexity, patience steady him amidst difficulties, and humility remain his constant companion even in success.

Emergency Meeting of All Assam Kaibarta Youth-Student Association and Assam Scheduled Caste Youth-Student Union at DRDA Conference Hall, Dibrugarh



M Hashim Ali, **Dibrugarh**: An important emergency meeting was held in Dibrugarh at the DRDA Conference Hall under the joint initiative of the All Assam Kaibarta Youth-Student Association and the Assam Scheduled Caste Youth-Student Union. The meeting was presided over by Jayanta Das, President of the All Assam Kaibarta Youth-Student Association. The purpose of the meeting was explained by the General Secretary, Gaurishankar Das. Das said that Chief Minister Dr. Himanta Biswa Sarma's government is being strongly opposed for its unconstitutional and destructive decision to include the Keot community in the Sched-

uled Caste list by disregarding the genuine issues of the existing Scheduled Caste communities. He further stated that this opposition would continue in the coming days as well. Even after 79 years of independence, the Kaibarta community has been deprived of constitutional benefits. For instance, the government has taken initiatives to uplift around 40 communities in Assam by providing them Development Councils or Autonomous Councils. But the long- standing demand of the Kaibarta Youth- Student Association for an Autonomous Council or Development Council for the Kaibarta community has not been addressed even once.


Instead, the community has repeatedly been used merely as a vote bank. It is extremely unfortunate that even after 79 years of independence, the majority of Kaibarta people in Assam have not received land pattas. Hundreds of bighas of land are in the hands of doubtful settlers, but the oldest indigenous community of Assam, the Kaibarta people, have been unable to secure land rights. The meeting demanded that the government immediately distribute land pattas to these people.cEducation is the key to a community's progress. Therefore, the meeting demanded that the government provide a 5% educational quota for the Kaibarta community

in higher education.Other demands raised in the meeting include: Construction of Kaibarta Bhavans and Sati Radhika Cultural Centres in every Assembly constituency of Assam. Allocation of ? 1 crore government grant for preparing a historical chronicle of the Kaibarta community. Reservation of fishery mahals and fish markets in every district of Assam for members of the Kaibarta community, as most of them depend on the fishing trade."Preservation of heritage sites and monuments of the Kaibartya community that are on the verge of disappearing due to lack of conservation. Establishment of government initiatives in Kaibarta-dominated areas to provide employment opportunities to educated unemployed youth.Ensuring Assembly seats are reserved for Assamese-speaking Kaibarta people accord-

ing to their population

and reserving a Lok Sabha seat for them in the Brahmaputra Valley. Even after 79 years of independence, not a single Rajya Sabha seat has been allotted from the Scheduled Castes of Assam. The government must ensure this soon.The meeting also pointed out that constitutionally 12 Assembly constituencies should have been reserved for the Scheduled Castes, but instead only one constituency was reserved. Shockingly, three constituencies have been curtailed by the current government, thereby depriving genuine indigenous sons of the soil. This is unconstitutional."Therefore, the meeting decided to demand that the government stop such unconstitutional activities. It was also resolved that if the demands are not met, a series of democratic protest programmes will be organized in every district of Upper Assam from 27 August onwards.

What Does Donald Trump's Import Tariff Policy Indicate?

Donald Trump has effectively initiated a trade war against India by imposing a 25% tariff on goods imported from India. This policy means that Indian products in the American market will become costlier, as sellers will be forced to sell them at a price 25% higher than before. As a result, Indian goods will face increased difficulty competing with similar American-made products, potentially leading to a decline in imports from India.

Typically, a country imposes high import tariffs when it seeks to promote domestically produced goods by making foreign alternatives less attractive or more expensive to consumers. When Trump announced this policy, he even referred to India as the "tariff king," indicating his disapproval of India's existing trade practices. It became evident that Trump was not interested in continuing the same level of trade relationship with India as before.

Trump believes that imposing tariffs on imports will strengthen tain its status as a global superpower. However, a critical question arises: Why is Trump initiating a trade war with India despite the historically strong and friendly relations between the two countries? Is there a deeper motive behind this policy?

Several factors have contributed to Trump's stance. The first reason is the growing closeness between India and Russia. When the Russia-Ukraine war broke out, Western countries imposed economic and trade sanctions on Russia, aiming to cripple its financial capacity to continue the war. In response, Russia began selling its crude oil at highly discounted prices in the international market. India, along with China, started buying large quantities of this cheap oil. This development deeply concerned Trump.

The second reason is India's membership in BRICS—a group originally formed by Brazil, Russia, India, China, and South Africa. Though it began with five countries, the organization has expanded to ten members. The expansion of BRICS has raised con-

the U.S. economy and help main-cerns for Trump, who suspects that BRICS members are attempting to replace the U.S. dollar with a new global currency. Fearing a decline in the dollar's global dominance, Trump has issued threats of higher import tariffs on BRICS countries. His concern is also rooted in the fact that U.S. adversaries like China and Russia are key members of BRICS.

Previously, when Trump imposed tariffs on China, China responded with counter-tariffs. Eventually, when China refused to bow down, Trump was compelled to engage in talks to resolve the issue. However, recent discussions between the U.S. and India have not led to a resolution, prompting the U.S. to officially impose the 25% import tariff on Indian goods.

It's important to note that although the U.S. has imposed tariffs, it has also expressed hope that a solution can be reached through dialogue. This suggests that even though Trump is engaging in a trade war with India, he is uncertain about achieving a clear advantage and is keeping the door open for negotiation.

Trump has left no stone unturned in trying to win this trade war, using threats and pressure tactics to force other nations to accept American trade policies. Despite having previously labeled India's economy as "dead," Trump still doesn't have the confidence to ignore India completely. He continues to support India's rivals, such as Pakistan and Bangladesh, in various ways as part of his strategy to prevail in this trade war. But India is standing firm and has refused to yield to Trump's pressure.

The real outcome of this trade war remains to be seen. It is likely that India, too, will suffer some economic losses. Therefore, how India responds to Trump's aggressive trade tactics will be closely watched. If India manages to handle the situation diplomatically and effectively, it could ultimately turn the situation in its favor and be seen as a significant diplomatic win.






