CM presents cheques to 23,336 women beneficiaries under MMUA scheme at Golakganj



Dispur : Taking forward the transformative journey of women empowerment in the state, Chief Minister Dr. Himanta Biswa Sarma ceremonially distributed cheques worth Rs. 10,000 to each of the 23,336 women beneficiaries of Golakganj Legislative Assembly Constituency under Mukhya Mantri Mahila Udyamita Abhiyan at a programme

held at Halakura HS School field, Golakganj in Dhubri district. Speaking on the occasion, Chief Minister Dr. Sarma said that through this scheme, State government is trying to empower 40 lakh women across the state and transform them into successful entrepreneurs. He also said that efforts are underway to ensure inclusion of those women who, for

various reasons, could not apply or were left out from the scheme. Dr. Sarma stated that Assam has 40 lakh women associated with self-help groups (SHGs). Referring to Prime Minister Narendra Modi's vision of 'Lakhpati Didi,' the Chief Minister said that his government has been trying relentlessly to empower the 40 lakh women as 'Lakhpati Baideu,' as he stated that a large number of women in the state have already achieved this milestone. Highlighting the significant role of women in strengthening both their families and the overall state economy through SHG activities, the Chief Minister cited the success stories from Golakganj Legislative Assembly constituency. He stated the example of Minu Ray, a member of the Lohit Self-Help Group under Nariprogoti CLF and Milonjyoti Village Organization, who joined the SHG movement in 2004 under the Assam State Rural Livelihood Mission (ASRLM). *see page 10*

CM Sarma distributes land pattas to 4,600 Tribal families in Kamrup

Abhijit Kalita, Guwahati: In celebration of the 150th birth anniversary of tribal icon Birsa Munda, the country is observing Janjatiya Gaurav Diwas from November 1 to 15. Marking the occasion, Chief Minister Dr. Himanta Biswa Sarma distributed land pattas to 4,600 tribal families belonging to 73 villages under the East and West Kamrup Forest Divisions, covering areas such as Lakhara, Bandapara, Kulsi, Loharghat, Bamunigaon, Boko, and Singra. The distribution took place at a massive public gathering held at Pantan Higher Secondary School playground on Tuesday.

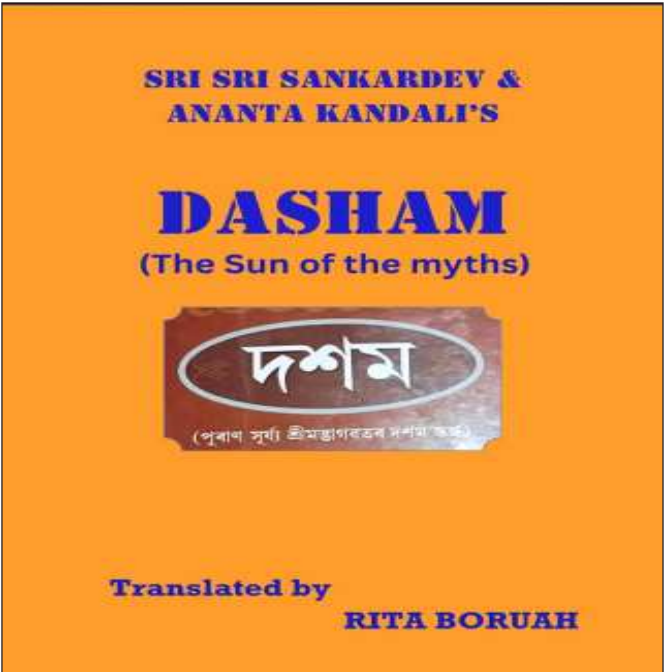
The ceremony began with floral tributes to Birsa Munda, after which the Chief Minister addressed the gathering. He stated that between 2005 and 2014, no government in Assam was able to grant land rights to tribal communities. After assuming office in 2021, he directed all Deputy Commissioners and district officials to ensure that every tribal family living in forest areas is



granted legal land rights. He reaffirmed that no tribal resident living in forest areas will ever be evicted and reiterated his earlier commitment to provide land pattas to all landless tribal families within five years — a promise that, he said, has now been fulfilled.

Speaking on the implementation of the 'Basundhara' scheme, the Chief Minister mentioned that while the government had invited applications from all citizens, only about 1.5 lakh tribal people applied at that *see page 10*

**Government Introduces New Food Sup-
port Programme in Naduar Constituency**

Jamugurihat: Along with other parts of Assam, a new food distribution scheme was launched at Towbhanga in the Naduar constituency, Sonitpur District, Jamugurihat under the National Food Security Act (NFSA). The programme aims to make essential food items like masoor dal, sugar, and salt available to benefi- ciaries at subsidised rates. The initiative follows the state-wide launch by Chief Minister Dr. Himanta Biswa Sarma and was officially inaugurated in Towbhanga at the Nabil Fair Price Shop. The ceremony was attended by local residents, ration card holders, and coopera- tive agents. Panchayat member Jyoti Das inaugurated the local launch by cutting the ceremonial ribbon. Under this new scheme, every ration card holder will now be able to purchase masoor dal at ₹69 per kilogram, sugar at ₹38 per kilogram, and salt at ₹10 per kilogram. These items will be available along with the free rice already provided under the NFSA. People gathered at the event expressed happiness over the government’s decision, saying the scheme would greatly help poor and middle-income families, especially at a time when prices of daily es- sentials continue to rise. Local cooperative agents said that the distribution pro- cess has been arranged to ensure smooth delivery and transparency. Officials present at the event mentioned that the inclusion of these items will improve the nutritional intake of families and reduce the burden of household expenses. The launch in Naduar marks another step toward the Assam government’s goal of ensuring affordable food for every family in the state.

A Neurosurgeon with a Golden Touch

(A profile of Dr Naba J borah, Senior Consultant Neurosurgeon at Health City Hospital, Guwahati — a man whose healing hands and compassionate heart have redefined the art of medicine in Assam.)

be honest, hardworking, and humble — qualities that would later become the cornerstones of his medical journey. From his childhood days, Dr Borah demonstrated remarkable brilliance and a deep thirst for knowledge.

Even in lower primary school, he stood apart as a gifted and diligent pupil, soon becoming a favourite of his teachers. His early mentors, recognising his sharp intellect, perseverance, and insatiable curiosity, often predicted a shining future for the young boy who seemed destined to serve others. From those tender years, Dr Borah nurtured a clear and unwavering dream — to dedicate his life to medicine and to the service of humanity. This clarity of purpose continued through his schooling, as he consistently excelled in studies, showing an extraordinary ability to grasp complex concepts with both speed and depth. Although he studied in an Assamese-medium school up to Class Ten, he never felt any disadvantage during his MBBS or subsequent higher studies — MS (Surgery) and MCh (Neurosurgery). This remarkable adaptability, linguistic strength, and determination make his academic story both praiseworthy and inspiring — a symbol of how dedication can overcome any perceived limitation of background or medium.

Since childhood, he also displayed a special interest in quiz and debate competitions, developing a sharp intellect and confident personality that later served him well as a medical leader and communicator. His ability to think critically, articulate clearly, and express ideas logically made him one of the most outstanding students among his peers.

This innate brilliance and steadfast devotion followed him throughout his academic journey. During his MBBS, and later while pursuing his MS (Surgery) and MCh (Neurosurgery), Dr Borah not only achieved academic excellence but also earned admiration and affection from his teachers and peers alike. He was widely regarded as one of the most disciplined, hardworking,

and humble students in his batch. His teachers still recall a young man who combined quiet diligence with profound sincerity — a rare blend of intellect, humility, and empathy. His performance remained outstanding at every stage of his education. “It is indeed uncommon for someone to shine equally at undergraduate, postgraduate, and super-speciality levels; yet Dr Borah did so with effortless consistency. His punctuality, precision, clarity of thought, and deep compassion made him a student of exceptional quality. Those who trained him often speak of his inquisitive mind — a student who asked meaningful questions, listened patiently, and translated theoretical knowledge into practical wisdom. His genuine respect for his mentors, his gentle nature, and his focus on patient-centred learning made him one of the most loved and trusted medical students of his time.” Guided by this dedication and purpose, Dr Naba J Borah pursued his MBBS, MS (Surgery), and MCh (Neurosurgery) from Gauhati Medical College and Hospital (GMCH) — the most prestigious medical institution in North-East India. During his undergraduate years, he also showed strong leadership ability and served as General Secretary of the Students’ Union, leading his peers with maturity, fairness, and vision. His fascination with the mysteries of the human brain and the delicate architecture of the nervous system soon drew him to the demanding and intricate field of neurosurgery. In this challenging branch of medicine, he demonstrated not only remarkable surgical skill but also exceptional steadiness of mind, clarity of judgement, and an unshakable commitment to each patient’s welfare.

Over the years, Dr Borah has trained under some of the finest minds in neurosurgery and has continuously expanded his expertise through rigorous learning, attending advanced national and international workshops, and participating in research and conferences. His academic curiosity remains alive even today — he continues to learn, evolve, and teach, keeping himself abreast of the latest advancements in neurosurgi-

cal science.

At present, Dr Borah serves as Senior Consultant Neurosurgeon at Health City Hospital, Guwahati, where he leads a team of specialists handling some of the most critical brain and spine cases in the region. His wide-ranging expertise includes surgeries for brain tumours, aneurysms, spinal disorders, strokes, traumatic head injuries, and congenital neurological conditions. His contribution is remarkable not merely for the number of operations he has successfully performed but for the spirit of care, precision, and empathy that defines every procedure. According to official records, he has successfully performed over 10,000 brain and spine surgeries — an achievement that reflects both his unmatched skill and his relentless dedication to his patients.

Patients and their families often speak of him not just as a doctor but as a source of hope during their darkest moments. What distinguishes him is not only the brilliance of his hands but the depth of his heart. The hallmark of Dr Borah’s approach lies in his extraordinary calmness even amidst crisis. Those who have met him are struck by his composed demeanour, reassuring smile, and his ability to explain complex medical realities in the simplest and most humane manner. He listens — not only to symptoms but also to the unspoken fears and emotions of his patients. In an age where medical practice often becomes impersonal, such gentleness itself becomes a powerful healing force.

He is, indeed, a multitalented neurosurgeon with an outstanding personality. A gentle smile is always seen upon his lips — graceful and reassuring — reflecting the inner calm and confidence that define his presence. His demeanour radiates kindness and assurance, qualities that make his personality as magnetic as his professionalism.

Inside the operation theatre, Dr Naba J Borah appears as a figure of divine assurance — a presence of precision and calm whose hands move with the grace of prayer. Every procedure he performs, whether major or minor, receives the

Guwahati Police Bust Illegal Gambling Den in Kochpara, Five Arrested

Guwahati: In a targeted action against illegal betting, police in Guwahati conducted a raid in the Kochpara locality late on Monday night. The raid follows the arrest of five people for running a gambling den. The operation, according to the police, was based on confidential tip-offs that the den had been operational for some time, attracting locals and operating discreetly. The CGPD team from Satgaon PS arrested Rabin Talukdar (54), Rajib Sarma (32), Pradip Das (43), Hemanta Kr Roy (36) and Mahesh Kr Brahma (65), associated with the illegal activity. The suspects were running games, betting and other unauthorised gambling activities from a private residence in Kochpara. Police seized four mobile phones, bundles of blank gambling tickets, cash worth Rs 29,100, and other paraphernalia indicative of organised betting during the raid. Legal proceedings have

been initiated under relevant sections of the law. The police officials also clarified that apart from gaming laws, such dens create a web of debt, exploitation, and financial risk to the participants, most of whom are vulnerable. They appealed to people for increased vigilance over suspected gatherings in their neighbourhoods. Furthermore, the city intensifies efforts to put an end to illegal gambling. Reports suggest several raids have been conducted earlier in Guwahati, where numerous gambling rackets were found operating. The police teams similarly arrested participants in those raids, seizing tickets, cash, and betting materials, illustrating the chronic underground gambling problem of the city. As local police intensify their vigil in gambling dens, the raid at Kochpara underlines their determination and commitment to stem the spread of clandestine gambling and bring offenders to account.

11 Kg Opium Seized, Three Arrested Near Indo-Myanmar Border in Churachandpur.



Chandan Sarma, Tezpur : Security forces seized nearly 11 kilograms of raw opium and apprehended three alleged traffickers during an operation near the India-Myanmar border in Manipur's Churachandpur district, police said on Wednesday, October 29. "The operation, conducted by the Assam Rifles on October 28 at the Behiang check post under Behiang Police Station, led to the recovery of approximately 11 kg of opium concealed in two two-wheelers. Two mobile phones were also seized during the raid. The arrested individuals have been identified as Thangkhathawng (33) of Kannan Veng, Churachandpur district; Limminthang alias L. Khongsai (34) of Moreh Ward No. 9, currently residing at Tuibong, Churachandpur; and Thangjalet alias Letneu (31) of K. Nivangphai, Churachandpur district. "All three accused, along with the seized contraband and items, were handed over to Behiang Police Station for further legal action.

same depth of attention, concentration, and reverence. He never categorises surgeries by their apparent difficulty; for him, every operation is sacred, and every patient equally important. His surgical discipline is marked by sincerity, precision, and unwavering alertness — qualities that have earned him the trust and admiration of colleagues and patients alike. Those who have observed him closely often say that within the sterile silence of the theatre, his calm focus transforms anxiety into confidence, his measured voice steadies every heartbeat, and his meticulous movements inspire awe. His devotion to his duty transcends routine professionalism; it reflects a spiritual connection with the act of healing itself.

I have personally witnessed this rare quality of his. I still remember vividly the day when my father-in-law was rushed to the hospital after a sudden brain stroke. The cloud of uncertainty and fear that surrounded our family was unbearable. In that moment of despair, it was Dr Naba J Borah who brought light to our darkness. His calm presence, confident assurance, and comforting words instilled instant faith within us. With exceptional precision and tireless care, he performed an emergency neurosurgical procedure that transformed what could have been a tragedy into a story of miraculous recovery. His continuous monitoring, dedication during post-operative care, and his gentle encouragement throughout the recovery period reflected not only his medical brilliance but his humanity in its purest form.

My own experience as a patient under his care deepened my respect for him even further. I had long suffered from a debilitating Prolapsed Intervertebral Disc (PIVD L5/S1), which had made daily life painful. When I consulted Dr Borah, his diagnosis was both thorough and compassionate. His gentle counselling gave me the confidence to undergo surgery under his care. The operation, performed by his skillful hands, was a complete success. His regular follow-ups and personal attention ensured a smooth recovery. Today, I live free of pain, and I remain forever grateful — not only for his medical expertise but for the kindness and grace with which he treated me.

Such stories are not isolated. They echo across countless families in Assam and the North-East. People travel from distant districts and even neighbouring states, seeking his

care. They come not only for treatment but for the reassurance that his presence brings. His colleagues describe him as a perfectionist — disciplined, punctual, meticulous, and deeply ethical. He sets high standards for himself and inspires those around him through example rather than instruction. His leadership, humility, and camaraderie make him universally respected among his peers, nurses, and support staff — both during his tenure at GNRC and now at Health City Hospital.

What truly distinguishes Dr Naba J Borah is the rare harmony between his technical mastery and the warmth of his personality. He is known for his soft-spoken manner, gentle humour, and the calm aura that surrounds him. He possesses a remarkable ability to connect with people through his words and eyes. His communication is not merely about explaining medical facts — it carries empathy, wisdom, and reassurance. That steady eye contact, filled with compassion and confidence, often does more healing than medicine itself. These are not learnt behaviours; they are gifts of nature that amplify the strength of his healing touch.

Despite his enormous achievements, Dr Borah remains humble, approachable, and deeply empathetic. He treats every patient as a human being deserving of dignity and patience. Colleagues admire his ethical clarity and tireless dedication; patients remember him as a doctor whose presence alone brings comfort. His personality embodies a rare combination of scientific precision and human sensitivity, making him not only a doctor but also a mentor and inspiration to all who meet him.

Dr Borah's philosophy of care rests on the belief that every patient deserves not only treatment but also time, empathy, and understanding. He sees medicine as an art that heals the mind as much as the body. His consultations reflect patience, attentiveness, and compassion — qualities that set him apart in today's fast-paced world of healthcare.

Beyond the operation theatre, Dr Naba J Borah has become a familiar and respected voice on health talk shows, seminars, and awareness programmes, where he educates the public about neurological health, brain and spine care, and the importance of early diagnosis. 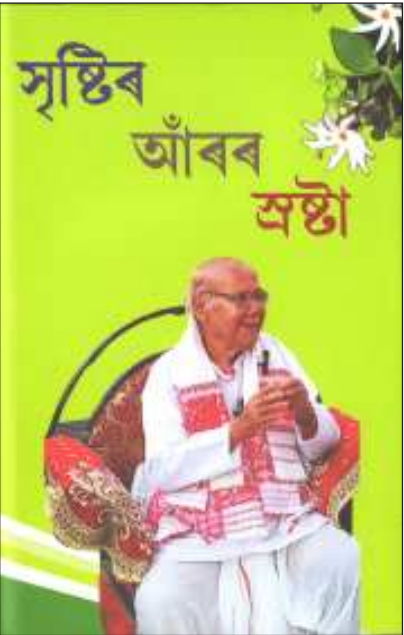

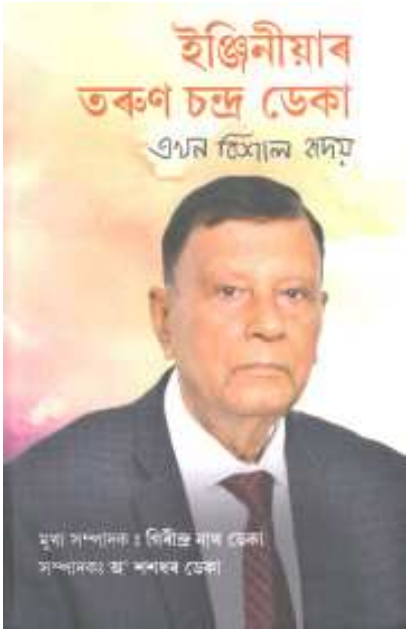

We are committed to empower

Recognizing the local demand for eco-friendly disposable items, she began manufacturing paper plates and today earns Rs. 15,000 per month. Similarly, Mamoni Bala Ray, a member of the Joymati Self-Help Group under Pobitro Village Organization in Golakganj Development Block, earns about Rs. 12,000 per month through mushroom cultivation. The Chief Minister said that women like them exemplify the growing self-reliance of Assam's women. The Chief Minister on the occasion also stressed on the proper utilization of the first instalment of the seed capital. He advised that the women beneficiaries may either pool their funds within their SHGs to start a joint venture, or use the amount individually to start a new business/expand an existing family enterprise. He moreover added that if the seed capital that is Rs. 10,000 is properly utilized, beneficiaries will subsequently receive Rs. 25,000 and Rs. 50,000 as the second and third instalment. By investing this amount productively, every woman can truly become a 'Lakhpati Baideu', he remarked. The Chief Minister also elaborated on the Nijut Moina Scheme, another flagship initiative of the present State government. Speaking about the government's upcoming legislative initiative to curb polygamy in Assam, he said that the cabinet has already decided to move forward with a law prohibiting multiple marriages. Any man entering into a second marriage will face seven years of imprisonment, and the related bill will be tabled in the Assembly on November 25 this year. Dr. Sarma affirmed that even if the government faces criticism for such steps, these measures will continue in the interest of ensuring respect and security for women in the state. Speaking on the Orunodoi Scheme, the Chief Minister said that it has elevated the dignity and honour of women in their households. He announced that an additional 4,000 beneficiaries from Golakganj will soon be included under the scheme. He explained that beneficiaries under Orunodoi scheme receive Rs. 1,250 per month, while ration card holders get 20-30 kg of rice per month and Rs. 250 as old-age pension and Rs. 1,250 as widow pension. Furthermore, ration card families will enjoy free medical services. He also announced that the amount of old-age pension will soon be increased.

CM Sarma distributes land

time. Many eligible tribal families did not submit applications as they already possessed ancestral land, and the scheme itself allowed applications for up to seven bighas of land. Dr. Sarma further informed that since his government took office, 1.5 lakh bighas of land have been cleared from encroachers and preserved as forest land. He asserted that the state's twin objectives are to secure rightful ownership of land for genuine tribal and landless families, while also protecting Assam's forest resources. He also referred to recent eviction drives conducted by the state government in Paikan Reserve Forest and Dahikata Forest on November 9, aimed at clearing land encroached by suspected illegal Bangladeshi immigrants. The Chief Minister made it clear that in the coming days, all illegal encroachers and non-eligible settlers occupying forest or government land without valid rights will be evicted.

Foreign Delegates Explore Kaziranga, Celebrates Assam's

Many visitors described the experience as "unforgettable," noting the park's pristine beauty and well-preserved ecosystem. Along with the safari, the guests were entertained with a colourful cultural programme that also included Assam's traditional Sattriya dance-one of India's classical dance forms. Additionally, they went to Orchidarium, which houses hundreds of orchid species native to the Northeast. Experts briefed them on the ecological significance of these flowers and how they support local people's livelihoods. Visitors were very appreciative of the conservation efforts that go on in the park and how professional the staff are in maintaining the area. "We are very excited to be here. It is beautiful! This is my first visit to Assam, and learning about nature here has been a gift so far," said one of the delegates. Subsequently, this visit by the foreign delegates has not only boosted Assam's global image as a tourism destination but also strengthened the cultural and environmental ties between the state and the visiting nations.

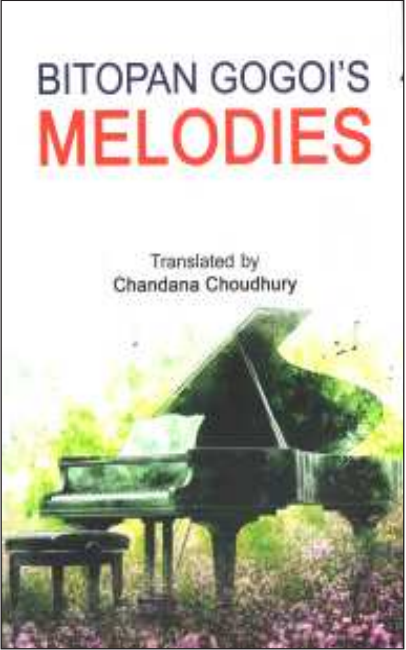

Poetry has long been hailed as the purest reflection of the human soul, a mirror to emotion, time, and consciousness. MELODIES, a collection of twenty-two Assamese poems by Bitopan Gogoi, now rendered into English by Chandana Choudhury, exemplifies this timeless truth. Each poem in the volume



resonates with its own unique tone, exploring love, longing, nature, identity, and the shifting hues of human experience. The book's cover, designed by Assam's celebrated poet and writer Bipul Kumar Dihingia, serves as a visual prelude to the poetic journey within. Its imagery reflects the serenity and rhythm of life, inviting readers into a space where words breathe and emotions flourish. The design harmonizes with the thematic cadence of the collection, bridging art and life in a vibrant dialogue. MELODIES, is more than a compilation of poems; it is a symphonic journey through life's manifold moods. Each piece functions as a note in the grand orchestration of existence, where love, nature, sorrow, and hope merge into a cohesive, soulful melody. The translation by Choudhury maintains the lyrical depth and emotional resonance of

Gogoi's original work, successfully balancing the poems' cultural specificity with universal appeal. Published by Sristi Prakash, Chengmara, Gohpur, Assam, the book is an important contribution to contemporary Assamese literature and now accessible to a global audience. Gogoi's anthology opens with Self-Talk, a contemplative exploration of inner dialogue and identity. The Dam of Song captures restrained emotions, while The Dream of Happiness delicately reflects the fleeting nature of joy and human aspiration. In Ice Blood, the poet juxtaposes warmth and coldness to explore emotional numbness, and It Will Bloom in the Dark offers hope, portraying darkness as a womb of resilience and creation.

Themes of memory and sensuality emerge in The Scent of Jasmine, whereas The Fire of Love portrays passion as a purifying elemental force. Nature and renewal are vividly rendered in Clump of Yellow, and The Virginity of Sadness sanctifies sorrow as a source of emotional depth. Poems such as Light Will Be Born and A Thousand Petals of Narcissus blend spiritual awakening with introspection, while A Thirsty Midday and The Golden Sickles explore existential yearning and the rhythms of labor and creation.

Intimacy and nostalgia permeate A Letter to a Friend and Lost Dreams, while Notorious challenges societal norms. Day and Night meditates on life's dualities, and Bound with Love and Strength celebrates resilience and human connection. Modernity enters with Speed Perception, a reflection on the tempo of contemporary life, while cultural pride shines in Blooming Zubeen and Dihiri, O Dihiri, rooted deeply in Assamese soil. The collection closes gracefully with Reminiscences, a reflective culmination of memory and poetic catharsis.

Foundation stone laid for Lakshmi Temple



Deepshikha Nath, Chhaygaon : The foundation stone for a permanent Sri Sri Lakshmi Temple at Bar Tezpur under Palasbari LAC, was laid on last wednesday at the auspicious occasion of Raas Purnima. The initiative marks a significant milestone in the 74-year-long tradition of the area's renowned Sri Sri Lakshmi Puja, which has been celebrated continuously since its inception in 1952. The foundation-laying ceremony was inaugurated at 11 a.m. by Ratneswar Das, retired principal and president of the recently formed Sri Sri Lakshmi Temple Construction Committee. The

event saw the presence of Working President Bipul Dutta, General Secretary Dhruba Kumar Das, members of the committee, officials of the village development committee, and a large gathering of residents and well-wishers from Rampur, Saru Tezpur, Satpakhali and Kukurmara. Following the ceremony, tributes were paid to Dr. Bhupen Hazarika and Zubeen Garg, honouring their contributions to Assamese art and culture. A public meeting was then held with over a hundred attendees from Bar Tezpur and nearby areas. The meeting, presided over by Ratneswar Das

and anchored by Bimal Kalita, president of the Bar Tezpur Village Development Committee, featured speeches emphasizing unity and collective effort toward temple construction. During the meeting, Bimal Kalita briefly recounted the history of the Lakshmi Puja at Baratejpur. Other notable speakers included journalist Bimal Sharma, social worker Prabhas Chandra Choudhury, Kameswar Das and community members Dhairya Das, Prabodh Kalita, Dhiraj Kalita, Bipin Singh of Ekua Enterprise, and Kulendu Goswami of Kukurmara, who all pledged continued support for the temple project. According to General Secretary Dhruba Kumar Das, the temple is estimated to cost around Rs 30 lakh and the committee aims to complete construction before the 2026 Lakshmi Puja.

Country-made pistol recovered in Rampur, two arrested

Deepshikha Nath, Chhaygaon : A country-made pistol was recovered at Rampur under Palasbari Police Station on Tuesday. The firearm was reportedly seized from one Tapan Mazumdar, police sources said. Along with the pistol, police also recovered three empty cartridges and one live round. Preliminary investigation revealed that Mazumdar had allegedly threatened his wife and child with the weapon during a domestic quarrel and forced them out of the house. Following the incident, police arrested Mazumdar on charges of issuing death threats and illegal possession of arms. Further interrogation led to the arrest of Jatin Rabha of Salbari in Loharghat area, who allegedly supplied the handmade pistol. Both accused are now in police custody and further investigation is underway.
